#### **TERMS OF REFERENCE**

- 1. To co-ordinate on behalf of Government arrangements in Hong Kong for social and recreational welfare of all serving seamen, with the exception of those who are residing in Hong Kong. The term "serving seamen" shall be construed to mean "those seamen visiting the port and those temporarily residing here, consequent upon discharge for health or other reasons, awaiting re-engagement or repatriation".
- 2. To allocate any grants or monies which the Committee may receive from all sources for the social and recreational welfare of seamen.
- 3. To obtain information on developments and facilities in connection with seamen's welfare in other ports, and to take appropriate action in the light of this information.
- 4. To take such other action as it may see fit to promote the welfare of visiting seamen, including action in conjunction with other social and recreational bodies.
- 5. To publish an annual report and audited accounts.

#### **REPORT**

#### Introduction

Established in 1947, the Port Welfare Committee (the Committee) is a non-statutory body which co-ordinates social and recreational welfare services for visiting seafarers. The Committee has been



recognised by the Inland Revenue Department as a charitable institution or trust of a public character since 1961. The membership of the Committee is a tripartite representation of government departments, representatives of employers' associations (i.e. the shipping trade) and employees' institutions (i.e. the seamen's unions), which is concerned with the welfare of visiting seafarers on ships calling at Hong Kong. The Committee aims to ensure that proper arrangements are made to safeguard the social and recreational welfare of visiting seafarers of all nationalities.

#### Seafarers' Welfare Agencies

2. It is an international common practice for major ports to provide support to seafarers away from home for prolonged periods at sea. Such services include social and welfare provisions alongside onshore facilities such as affordable accommodation of reasonable standard and other recreational facilities. In Hong Kong, such support services are provided by The Sailors Home and Mission to Seafarers (The Mission) and Danish Seamen's Church, Hong Kong (The Church). These two seafarers' welfare agencies derive their income from the services they offer, such as restaurant facilities and accommodation. In addition, the Committee's subventions are one of their sources of funds.

#### **Finance**

3. The Committee relies upon yearly donations from the shipping and commercial community for its financial resources. With appeal letters sent annually to the community, the Committee receives their generous contributions for the



noble cause of supporting our visiting seafarers. The total amount of donations collected in Financial Year (FY) 2023-24 was HK\$120,000. Each year, the Committee allocates the donations to the two aforementioned seafarers' welfare agencies. In FY 2023-24, a subvention of HK\$110,000 was granted to The Mission and HK\$11,000 to The Church.

#### **Port Statistics**

4. Hong Kong is an international maritime centre and a regional hub port. It is one of the busiest ports in the world. In 2023, vessel arrivals at the



Hong Kong port amounted to more than 92 000 and the Hong Kong port handled 14.4 million twenty-foot equivalent units (TEUs<sup>1</sup>) of containers in the year, totaling 175 million tonnes of cargo. There were 8.48 million cross-boundary ferry and cruise passenger journeys in the year.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> A twenty-foot container is the notional standard of "box" of modern cargo logistics. The standard has given rise to the basic measure for container ships and port traffic, the twenty-foot equivalent unit (TEU).



#### **Employment**

5. The shortage of manpower is a subject of concern of the maritime industry in Hong Kong. The government and the industry have joined hands to train up local seafarers to help alleviate this shortage. A scheme titled "Seagoing Training Incentive Scheme" (the Scheme) was set up in 2004 with an initial funding of \$9.0 million. An additional amount of \$19.2 million was granted by the government in 2009. The Maritime & Aviation Training Fund injected more fund in 2024 totaling for \$28.637 million up till March 2024. As at the same date, 705 young persons joined the Scheme with 307 deck cadets and 124 engineer cadets reaching the standard of Class 3 Certificate of Competency (CoC). Among the above cadets who obtained Class 3 CoC, 99 deck officers and 48 engineer officers had obtained Class 1 CoC. The results were both encouraging and promising.

#### The Sailors Home and Mission to Seafarers<sup>2</sup>



#### Background



Established in 1856 in the United Kingdom, The Sailors Home and Mission to Seafarers (formerly titled The Sailors Home and Missions to Seamen) is an international charitable institution for all seafarers.

The Mission is committed to promoting spiritual materials and moral welfare of seafarers through provision of chaplaincy services, accommodation and recreational facilities. Being inter-denominational in character, The Mission has been working in ecumenical partnership with other denominations, including Apostolatus Maris, German Seamen's Mission and Church of Sweden Abroad. These denominations use the Mariners' Club in Kwai Chung as a base for their ministry in the port.

Of more than 100 chaplaincies of The Mission worldwide, the port chaplain in Hong Kong was established in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century. The Mission was recognised as a statutory corporation by the Government in 1930.

In May 2018, The Sailors Home and Missions to Seamen was retitled The Sailors Home and Mission to Seafarers under the Sailors Home and Mission to Seafarers Incorporation Ordinance (Cap. 1042). The Mission, in lieu of The Missions, connotes that it serves seafarers of all nationalities, creeds and genders.

6. With the contribution of the Mission, the following article describes its meritorious work in FY 2023-24 –

#### Reaching-out to Seafarers

This year has seen a slow and gradual return of cruise ships to Hong Kong, using both Kai Tak Terminal and Ocean Terminal. In FY 2023-24, the Chaplaincy team visited 6 631 ships anchored in Hong Kong. The Mission continued to provide shop to ship service but such service is now phasing out as shore leave is once again returning to pre-pandemic levels. Instead, the Mission arranged to take members of the crew on a day out by its launch which could accommodate up to 20 passengers for a trip. So far, three trips to Lamma Island, Stanley, and South Lantau were arranged. Seafarers were happy to have a short break from the daily routine of on-board work and activities as shown in photos below.



#### **Provision of Internet Support**

8. The Mission noted that more vessels calling in Hong Kong now are fitted with "Starlink", which provides seafarers with high-speed internet access on the water. The need



for data SIM cards, however, still seems to have remained the same. In this regard, the Mission will monitor the situation about the "Starlink" usage and the demand of data SIM cards.

#### Shuttle Service

9. In FY 2023-24, the Mission provided transport services to 3 937 seafarers from their vessels to either its drop-in-centre in Kwai Chung or to shopping centres in Kwai Fong, Tsing Yi and Tsim Sha Tsui. There was another free shuttle service providing hourly transfer from Kai Tak Cruise Terminal to East Tsim Sha Tsui. However, such service was suspended during COVID-19. Since the number of cruise vessel visits are increasing now, the Mission planned to resume the service in October 2024.

#### Sharing of Festive Joy

10. Christmas is one of the most joyful festivities treasured by the seafarers. In December 2023, the Mission distributed more than 10 000 presents to seafarers when their vessels called in Hong Kong. These gifts were purchased at a cost to the Mission in 2023 of HK\$399,966. Also, the Mission shared mooncakes during Mid-Autumn Festival and small gifts to Chinese Seafarers at Chinese New Year.





#### **Facilities**

- 11. The Mission operates two Mariners' Clubs: one is located right in the centre of "container port city" at Kwai Chung, while the other is located in Tsim Sha Tsui (TST) which is in the heart of the tourist area of Kowloon.
- 12. The Kwai Chung facility is accessible for seafarers whose vessels are often only in port for a matter of hours. Till now 4 138 seafarers have used the facilities in the centre in Kwai Chung.


13. The TST Club is an ideal location for seafarers who are leaving or joining their vessels and require accommodation as it is close to shopping malls, night markets and downtown activity in tourist nightlife. In March 2018, it was closed for redevelopment. However, the likely opening of the new centre has been delayed from Q2 2024 to Q3 2025 due to the fire incident happened in March 2023 and the accident of falling glass happened in March 2024. As a stop-gap measure, a temporary Drop-in-Centre has been established in Room 705, Wing On Plaza, East TST. This facility provides seafarers with a lounge with free WiFi and a bag drop for those who wish to go shopping. The services of chaplains who are on call for counselling are also available. The Drop-in-Centre also has a conference room that is available for the maritime community.

#### The Environment and Sustainability

14. The Mission's vehicle fleet, with an increase of one vehicle from three to four in 2024, will become all-electric. On the other hand, the



Mission will employ two more staff members in ship visiting teams. Such improvements enable the institution to provide more round-the-clock service to seafarers visiting Hong Kong.

#### Hong Kong Seafarers' Awards 2022 and 2023



15. The Seafarers Awards are established to commend companies that have excellent welfare provided to their seafarers by conducting surveys among the seafarers. The Mission held the Seafarers' Awards 2022 in June 2023 and the Seafarers' Awards 2023 in February 2024 respectively. The events allowed The Mission to make up for lost time due to the pandemic.

#### Danish Seamen's Church, Hong Kong<sup>3</sup>



#### Background

The Danish Seamen's Church in Hong Kong is a branch of the Danish Seamen's Church and The Danish Churches Abroad (Danske Sømands- og Udlandskirker) that is under the Protestant (Lutheran) Church. For more than 40 years, the Danish Seamen's Church has sent chaplains and staff to Hong Kong for the purpose of providing church services, spiritual and welfare services to seafarers on board Danish flagged vessels. The Danish Seamen's Church is a private organization.

In 1979, The Church reached out to Hong Kong port and became part of the ecumenical partnership at the Mariners' Club. Since then, it has helped Danes in Hong Kong and seafarers from all nationalities with anything from Christmas presents to spiritual aid.

16. With the contribution of the Church, the following article remarks its meritorious work in FY 2023-24 –

#### Sailing with the Seafarers

17. As part of training programme, the port chaplain sailed with a vessel from Hong Kong to Singapore in January 2024. The purpose is to spend time with the seafarers and to know the life and work of the seafarers better. The port chaplain would also arrange social evenings with bingo games and sport activities



#### **Funding**

18. While salary of the chaplain and the assistant are paid by the Church itself, all other financial resources for the daily running costs are private donations from Danes living in Hong Kong, Danish companies and organizations as well as global container logistics corporations. The Church also earned some income from events like the annual Christmas bazaar.

#### Christmas Bazaar

19. Christmas bazaar is the primary way in which donors support the work of the Church and it remains the most important social event in the calendar of the Church. The last Christmas Bazaar was held on 18 November 2023 in Kwai Chung Mariners' Club when the Scandinavian corporations in Hong Kong were invited to contribute their good and merchandise towards tombola and lucky draws. The Church sells food and Christmas decoration with the help from community volunteers. All income is used for the continuing operation of the Church.



#### Small Kiosk

20. Other than the annual Christmas Bazaar, The Church also has a small kiosk in the Danish Room. The kiosk provides a wide range of Danish goods which are typically difficult to find in Hong Kong, including Danish candy and food that the Danish Seafarers are happy to buy when they arrive in Hong Kong. The income is used for the operations of the welfare services.



#### Welfare Services to Seafarers

#### Ship visits

21. Before the vessels arrive in Hong Kong, the Church will send them emails and get prepared if any help or assistance is required. It can be as simple as buying some games, medicines, sim cards, nutrition supplements, electronic items, or other "daily needs". Especially at Christmas time, the Church helped buy, wrap and deliver Christmas presents to seafarers. After the vessel left, the Church will keep in daily contact with many seafarers online on WhatsApp and other platforms. In 2023-24, the Church has visited 171 Danish flagged vessels, and occasionally visited vessels sailing under others flags when the seafarers contacted them.





#### Children's events

Twice a month, the Church holds a playgroup for children. It is primarily for parents with children, who have Danish roots. Many marriages consist of mixed nationalities in Hong Kong. Children who were born and brought up in Hong Kong can know more about Danish traditions, eat Danish food, and learn Danish in the playgroup.





23. The Church also organizes other children's events of Danish traditions, provides church services, or celebrate children's birthdays.



#### Shuttle service

24. Since COVID-19 restrictions were lifted, many seafarers use shuttle service provided by the Church again. Seafarers are picked up in front of the vessel and transferred to the Mariners' Club or the MTR station. Return shuttle service is also available.

#### Online conversations with seafarers

25. The Church once provided an online-chat platform for seafarers called "Conversations at Sea". It was eventually closed due to low usage as each port chaplain has personal contact with seafarers. The seafarers preferred to keep contact with the Church direct for personal conversation on WhatsApp, email and other online platform, even after they left the port.

#### Newspapers and Books Delivery

Apart from provision of necessities, the Church has subscribed newspapers across the world and distributed printouts to the seafarers with the help of "Sea Health and Welfare", which is an international seafarers' welfare and assistance network. In supporting all seamen from different nationalities, the Church has delivered newspapers from various countries. Danish and English books



are also provided when requested. The Church continues to collect books and DVDs from donors, so that the seafarers can enjoy reading.

#### **Facilities**

27. The Church provides a meeting place, the 'Danish Room', in the Mariners' Club, for seafarers to gather and mingle with each other. It is a good place for relaxation and conversation with fresh coffee on the jug provided. The Church plays an indispensable role in providing quality welfare services to the seafarers. Besides, the Church provides church services twice a month in Mariners'



Club, including blessing of marriages, baptism and confirmations. After the church services, participants would have lunch together to enjoy warm fellowship time.

#### **Future**

As decided by the Headquarter in Denmark, no assistant will be sent out to Hong Kong anymore and the port chaplain will be the only staff in Hong Kong in future. Nevertheless, in the coming year, the Church in the port of Hong Kong would endeavour to visit all Danish flagged vessels and offer spiritual and material assistance to everyone on board.

### PORT WELFARE COMMITTEE ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND EXPLANATORY NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2024

#### Reporting entity

Port Welfare Committee is a Committee operated by the Marine Department of the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region. The Committee's registered office is located at 21/F, Harbour Building, 38 Pier Road, Central, Hong Kong.

The Committee is a non-profit making body and its principal activity is to ensure that proper arrangements are made to safeguard the welfare of and provide recreational facilities for visiting seafarers of all nationalities.

#### 1. Basis of preparation and accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and are prepared on a cash basis. Moreover, the financial statements are prepared on the assumption that the committee is a going concern.

#### 2. Taxation

No provision for taxation is necessary as the Committee is exempted as a charitable body.

#### 3. Committee Members' emoluments

The Committee Members did not receive any emoluments from the Committee.
