SECTION 1

COMMENCEMENT, INTERPRETATION & GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

1.1 Commencement

1.1.1 The Certificates of Proficiency for Safety, Security and Designated Duties Training Determinations (the Determinations) are made by the Seafarers' Authority (hereafter referred to as "the Authority") under powers granted by the Merchant Shipping (Seafarers) (Safety, Security and Designated Duties Training) Regulation (Cap. 478AJ) and are the second edition that shall be effected on 28 February 2022.

1.2 Interpretation

1.2.1 In the Determinations, unless the context otherwise requires:

"approved" means approved or recognized by the Director of Marine;

"Authority" means the Seafarers' Authority established by section 4(1) of the Merchant Shipping (Seafarers) Ordinance, Cap. 478. For the purpose of the Determinations, Director of Marine is the Seafarers' Authority;

"Convention" means the International Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers, 1978, as from time to time revised or amended by any revision or amendment to any provision of such Convention that applies to Hong Kong;

"Director" means the Director of Marine;

"designated security duties" means the duties designated in accordance with the ship security plan of a ship;

"fast rescue boat" means a boat complying with the requirements of the Guidelines for Fast Rescue Boats adopted by the International Maritime Organization by Resolution A.656(16);

"rescue boat" means a boat designed to rescue persons in distress and to marshal a survival craft;

"ship security officer" means a ship security officer as defined by rule 1 of the Merchant Shipping (Security of Ships and Port Facilities) Rules (Cap. 582 sub. leg. A);

"ship security plan" means a ship security plan as defined by rule 1 of the Merchant Shipping (Security of Ships and Port Facilities) Rules (Cap. 582 sub. leg. A);

"STCW Code" means the Seafarers' Training, Certification and Watchkeeping Code published by the International Maritime Organization, as from time to time revised or amended by any revision or amendment to any provision of such Code that applies to Hong Kong; and

"survival craft" means a craft of a ship capable of sustaining the lives or persons in distress from the time of abandoning the ship.

1.3 General Requirements

- 1.3.1 The subsequent sections of the Determinations set out the training and qualification requirements for Safety, Security and Designated Duties and the conditions to be satisfied by any person to qualify for a certificate of proficiency, the manner in which the attainment of such standards or the satisfaction of such conditions is to be established, the procedure for the application and issue of a certificate of proficiency.
- 1.3.2 Any person who feels aggrieved by any decision of the Authority to refuse to issue a certificate of proficiency may appeal against the decision to the Administrative Appeals Board within thirty (30) days of being informed of such decision.
- 1.3.3 The Director may, at his discretion, permit exemption from any or all of the provisions of the Determinations.

1.4 Transitional Provisions

- 1.4.1 During the transitional period, a contravention of section 4, 5 or 7 does not constitute an offence under section 17 of the Merchant Shipping (Seafarers) (Safety, Security and Designated Duties Training) Regulation (Cap. 478AJ).
- 1.4.2 In this section –

transitional period means the period beginning on 1 December 2016 and ending on 31 December 2016.

SECTION 2

CERTIFICATES OF PROFICIENCY

GENERAL PROVISIONS

2.1 Certificates of Proficiency for Safety, Security and Designated Duties Training

- 2.1.1 Certificate of Proficiency means any of the following certificates issued under the Merchant Shipping (Seafarers) (Safety, Security and Designated Duties Training) Regulation (Cap. 478AJ)
 - (a) Certificate of Proficiency in Basic Training;
 - (b) Certificate of Proficiency in Designated Security Duties;
 - (c) Certificate of Proficiency in Security Awareness;
 - (d) Certificate of Proficiency for Ship Security Officers;
 - (e) Certificate of Proficiency in Survival Craft and Rescue Boats other than Fast Rescue Boats;
 - (f) Certificate of Proficiency in Fast Rescue Boats;
 - (g) Certificate of Proficiency in Advanced Fire Fighting;
 - (h) Certificate of Proficiency in Medical first Aid; and
 - (i) Certificate of Proficiency in Medical Care.

2.2 Application

2.2.1 The applicant for a Certificate of Proficiency for Safety, Security and Designated Duties Training must complete an application form which may be obtained from the Marine Department, Seagoing Examination and Mercantile Marine Office, or by post from:

- 2.2.2 Applicants should return the completed application form to the Seagoing Examination and Mercantile Marine Office together with the documents as stated in the application form.
- 2.2.3 The application must be accompanied by any evidence as may be necessary to establish that the requirements for the issue or the conditions for renewal of the certificate being applied for have been satisfied.
- 2.2.4 It is important that the correct procedure for application is followed as discharges may have to be forwarded for verification which can take time, and in the absence of such verification the application cannot be processed.

2.3 Enquiries

2.3.1 Applicants may make enquiries about their application and when doing so, should ensure that the point on which information is sought is clearly stated. Enquiries should be addressed to:

2.4 Particulars of Seagoing Service

- 2.4.1 An applicant's eligibility for a certificate of proficiency will depend, amongst other factors, on the amount of sea service performed and upon the seagoing ranks in which the applicant has served. It is, therefore, imperative that the particulars which applicants enter on the application form are accurately stated.
- 2.4.2 The amount of seagoing service set down in the Determinations for the Certificate of Proficiency for Safety, Security and Designated Duties Training is the **absolute minimum** that can be accepted. Unless applicants can prove the full amount they will not be issued with a certificate of proficiency.

2.5 Use of Information

- 2.5.1 Information required by the application form will be used by Marine Department for the process of application for and issue of certificate. This information may be divulged to other departments and agencies authorised to process the information for the mentioned purposes. Limited personal data of successful applicant may be used via the Marine Department's website for verification of the issued certificate of proficiency by any third parties.
- 2.5.2 Supply of information is obligatory. An applicant should ensure that all the information filled in the application form is accurate. Failure to do so may, besides subject to paragraph 2.6, result in an unsuccessful application.
- 2.5.3 For making correction and access to personal data after submission of application form, an applicant may contact the following officer:

2.6 Fraud or Misrepresentation

- 2.6.1 Applicants are reminded that the Merchant Shipping (Seafarers) ((Safety, Security and Designated Duties Training) Regulation (Cap. 478AJ) provides that any person who, in connection with an application for the issue of a certificate of proficiency:
 - (a) makes a false pretence; or
 - (b) supplies false information,

knowing it to be false, or not believing it to be true, commits an offence and is liable, amongst other things, to a fine and to imprisonment.

2.7 Attempted Bribery

2.7.1 Any applicant who offers an advantage to any officer of the Marine Department shall be guilty of an offence under the Prevention of Bribery Ordinance and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine and to imprisonment. Such an applicant will not be issued with a certificate for such a period as may be decided by the Director.

2.8 Quality Standards

2.8.1 The education and training courses which an applicant attends to satisfy the training requirements for the issue of a certificate of proficiency shall generally follow a quality standards system or an alternative system acceptable to the Director. A list of the approved training courses can be found at the Marine Department's website (https://www.mardep.gov.hk/filemanager/en/share/pub-services/pdf/crt_course.pdf).

2.9 Issue of Certificates

- 2.9.1 Applicants who are successful in meeting all the requirements for the issue of a certificate of proficiency being applied for, will be issued with a certificate of proficiency. When the certificate is ready it will be forwarded by registered post to the applicant's address as given on the application form, unless the applicant wishes to make other arrangements.
- 2.9.2 To avoid unnecessary delays in the issue of certificates, it is important that applicants should inform the Marine Department promptly of any change to the address given on the application form.

2.10 Fees

2.10.1 Applicants for the certificate of proficiency will be required to pay the prescribe fee (presently the fee is NIL) before any steps are taken to verify their eligibility for the issue of the certificate.

2.11 Issue of Replacement Certificate

2.11.1 If a Certificate of Proficiency for Safety, Security and Designated Duties Training is lost, destroyed, damaged or defaced, the holder may apply to the Seagoing Examination and Mercantile Marine Office for a replacement certificate. A fee will be charged (presently the fee is HK\$ 155) for the replacement certificate unless the holder can show that the certificate was lost as a result of shipwreck or fire on board ship. An applicant for a replacement certificate will be required to make a declaration to the Officer-in-charge of the Seagoing Examination and Mercantile Marine Office regarding the circumstances in which the certificate was lost. Upon the issue of a copy certificate, the certificate that was lost, destroyed, damaged or defaced ceases to be valid.

SECTION 3

SEA SERVICE

3.1 General

- 3.1.1 This section specifies provisions relating to qualifying sea service.
- 3.1.2 Except where otherwise specified, the qualifying sea service required for a Certificate of Proficiency for Safety, Security and Designated Duties Training is the service performed in ships which proceed to sea and which are actively engaged in commercial trading.
- 3.1.3 Qualifying sea service means time spent on board ship reckoned from the date of engagement to the date of discharge. Subject to verification, as and when necessary, certificates of discharge will be accepted as proof of seagoing service.
- 3.1.4 Proof of sea service for applicants serving on Hong Kong registered ships can be verified by the Mercantile Marine Office of Marine Department. Sea service on other ships must be confirmed by the Master(s) of the ship(s) concerned, or by the Consul or other recognized authority of the flag State. However, such confirmation will not necessarily be deemed sufficient.
- 3.1.5 Calculations of voyage length for the purpose of establishing sea service should be made in calendar months and days. When it happens that an applicant has signed off and signed on again on the same day, that day may only be counted once. To calculate total sea service, the length of each voyage should be added together in months and days. The total of days should then be divided by 30 to give months, and residual days. The months should then be added as the total months.

SECTION 4

QUALIFYING REQUIREMENTS

4.1 Certification of Proficiency in Basic Training

4.1.1 To qualify for the issue of a Certificate of Proficiency in Basic Training in Hong Kong, an applicant must have received safety familiarization and basic training or instruction in accordance with section A-VI/1, paragraph 2 of the STCW Code and must have met the appropriate standard of competence specified in that paragraph (standard of competence is shown in the Appendix I).

4.2 Certification of Proficiency in Designated Security Duties

4.2.1 To qualify for the issue of a Certificate of Proficiency in Designated Security Duties in Hong Kong, an applicant must have met the standard of competence specified in section A-VI/6, paragraphs 6 to 8 of the STCW Code (standard of competence is shown in the Appendix II).

4.3 Certificate of Proficiency in Security Awareness

4.3.1 To qualify for the issue of a Certificate of Proficiency in Security Awareness in Hong Kong, an applicant must have received security-related familiarization and security awareness training or instruction in accordance with section A-VI/6, paragraph 4 of the STCW Code and must have met the appropriate standard of competence specified in that paragraph (standard of competence is shown in the Appendix II).

4.4 Certificate of Proficiency for Ship Security Officers

- 4.4.1 To qualify for the issue of a Certificate of Proficiency for Ship Security Officers in Hong Kong, an applicant must:
 - (a) have approved seagoing service of not less than 12 months or appropriate seagoing service and knowledge of ship operations; and
 - (b) have met the standard of competence for certification of proficiency as ship security officer, set out in section A-VI/5, paragraphs 1 to 4 of the STCW Code (standard of competence is shown in the Appendix II).

4.5 Certificate of Proficiency in Survival Craft and Rescue Boats other than Fast Rescue Boats

- 4.5.1 To qualify for the issue of a Certificate of Proficiency in Survival Craft and Rescue Boats other than Fast Rescue Boats in Hong Kong, an applicant must:
 - (a) be not less than 18 years of age;
 - (b) have approved seagoing service of not less than 12 months or have attended an approved training course and have approved seagoing service of not less than six months; and

(c) have met the standard of competence for certificates of proficiency in survival craft and rescue boats, set out in section A-VI/2, paragraphs 1 to 4 of the STCW Code (standard of competence is shown in the Appendix III).

4.6 Certificate of Proficiency in Fast Rescue Boats

- 4.6.1 To qualify for the issue of a Certificate of Proficiency in Fast Rescue Boats in Hong Kong, an applicant must:
 - (a) be the holder of a certificate of proficiency in survival craft and rescue boats other than fast rescue boats;
 - (b) have attended an approved training course; and
 - (c) have met the standard of competence for certificates of proficiency in fast rescue boats, set out in section A-VI/2, paragraphs 7 to 10 of the STCW Code (standard of competence is shown in the Appendix III).

4.7 Certificate of Proficiency in Advanced Fire Fighting

4.7.1 To qualify for the issue of a Certificate of Proficiency in Advanced Fire Fighting in Hong Kong, an applicant must have successfully completed advance training in techniques for fighting fire, with particular emphasis on organization, tactics and command, in accordance with the provisions of section A-VI/3, paragraphs 1 to 4 of the STCW Code and must have met the standard of competence specified in those paragraphs (standard of competence is shown in the Appendix IV).

4.8 Certificate of Proficiency in Medical First Aid

4.8.1 To qualify for the issue of a Certificate of Proficiency in Medical First Aid in Hong Kong, an applicant must have met the standard of competence in medical first aid on board ship specified in section A-VI/4, paragraphs 1 to 3 of the STCW Code (standard of competence is shown in the Appendix V).

4.9 Certificate of Proficiency in Medical Care

4.9.1 To qualify for the issue of a Certificate of Proficiency in Medical Care in Hong Kong, an applicant must have met the standard of competence in medical care on board ships specified in section A-VI/4, paragraphs 4 to 6 of the STCW Code (standard of competence is shown in the Appendix VI).

4.10 Medical Fitness Certificate

- 4.10.1 Proof of medical fitness is an essential requirement for the issue of any certificate of proficiency. Medical fitness may be proven by the production of a certificate of medical fitness issued not more than two years beforehand by an approved medical practitioner.
- 4.10.2 Applicants in Hong Kong may obtain from the Mercantile Marine Office a list of medical practitioners who are approved by the Director to issue medical fitness certificates. The list could also be downloaded from the Marine Department's website

(https://www.mardep.gov.hk/en/pub_services/pdf/regmp.pdf).

SECTION 5

REVALIDATION OF CERTIFICATES

5.1 Updating Safety and Designated Duties Training

- 5.1.1 The following certificates of proficiency are valid for a period of not more than 5 years from the date issued
 - (a) Certificate of Proficiency in Basic Training;
 - (b) Certificate of Proficiency in Survival Craft and Rescue Boats other than Fast Rescue Boats;
 - (c) Certificate of Proficiency in Fast Rescue Boats; and
 - (d) Certificate of Proficiency in Advanced Fire Fighting.
- 5.1.2 Any person who wishes to have his/her certificates of proficiency renewed must have documentary evidence of either having completed the training course or updated their training (refresher) within the last 5 years.

SECTION 6

SECURITY-RELATED TRAININGS FOR SEAFARERS

6.1 Three Levels of Training

6.1.1 In addition to security-related familiarization, the security-related training consists of three levels of training: security-awareness training, training for seafarers with designated security duties and training for the ship security officer, with the training for ship security officer being the highest level. The training requirements for the higher levels of training would include the competencies of the lower levels of training. Holders of Certificate of Proficiency for Ship Security Officers should not be required to undergo further training and obtain Certificate of Proficiency in Designated Security Duties and Certificate of Proficiency in Security Awareness. Similarly, seafarers holding Certificate of Proficiency in Designated Security Duties should not be required to obtain Certificate of Proficiency in Security Awareness.

(1): Seafarers with Designated Security Duties
