

Marine Industrial Safety Alert

A Mainland Chinese crew fell down to the bottom of cargo hold in a container loading operation

1) Date of Accident: March 2022

2) Time of Accident: Evening

3) Place of Accident: In the waters off a container depot

4) Vessel involved: River Trade Vessel

5) Summary:

In an evening, a river trade vessel moored to the side of a dumb lighter berthing at the quay of a container depot for loading of containers. A load of 3 empty containers was lifted from shore by the derrick crane of the dumb lighter and loaded to the 3rd tier level of the containers in the cargo hold. Two crews on the river trade vessel were engaged to disengage the lifting slings from the containers. Whilst they were doing so, one of the crew lost his balance and fell 7.8m down to the bottom of the cargo hold. The crew was hospitalized and was later certified dead in the hospital.

Investigation of the accident is being carried out.

6) Safety alert:

- As a best practice, when handling containers by top lift slings, a load of not more than 2 empty containers should be handled at a time.
- Persons working at high level or any unfenced edges should always be alert of the danger of falling from height. Precautionary measures should always be provided when- and where-ever possible.

7) Applicable legislation:

Merchant Shipping (Local Vessels) (Works) Regulation (Cap. 548I), section 61 – "Safe means of access to and safe working on container top, etc."
